

Why languages?

Quite apart from the communicative benefits offered by the knowledge of foreign languages, there are many other advantages:

- Speaking a foreign language opens the way to understanding new cultures and finding out about other nations' ways of life
- The ability to speak a foreign language fluently increases your chances in the job market and opens up a whole spectrum of careers
- Speaking a modern language or having a degree in one does not lead down any single career path; instead, languages provide skills that are recognised by employers in a wide range of industries
- The career opportunities open to linguists are much wider than teaching and translating. Over 80% of language graduates go into the private sector where they use their language skills in well-paid jobs with exciting opportunities for travel or living abroad, such as business services, banking, finance or retail. With the role played by the EU, these opportunities are increasing constantly.
