### Les faux amis False friends

La journée (day), and le voyage (journey)
Les informations and l'actualité/les actualités
both refer to the news

Beware of English words used in French, but not as you might expect: un smoking (a dinner jacket) les people (celebrities) les tongs (flip flops) des baskets (trainers, sports shoes)

A lot of confusion seems to surround the three words:
une boisson (drink)
un poisson (fish)
un poison (poison)
