### Definite article (strong)

#### Indefinite article (mixed)

Nom	ein	ein <b>e</b>	ein
Acc	ein <b>en</b>	ein <b>e</b>	ein
Gen	ein <b>es</b>	ein <b>er</b>	ein <b>es</b>
Dat	ein <b>em</b>	ein <b>er</b>	ein <b>em</b>

### Which case?

These prepositions **require** the **accusative** case: bis, durch, für, gegen, ohne, um

Careful: entlang follows the accusative

These **must** be followed by the **dative** case: aus, außer, bei, gegenüber, mit, nach, seit, von, zu

These can be followed by **either** the **accusative** and **dative**, depending on context: an, auf, hinter, in, neben, über, unter, vor, zwischen
